## Octopuses and fish hunt together

Octopuses are usually considered to be solitary creatures, but new research suggests they might sometimes socialize with fish in order to share the responsibility of hunting. The findings broaden our understanding of the shared social life of octopuses and fish, scientists say.

In the past, the animals have been seen to hunt together for shared prey such as molluscs and crustaceans. The new study sheds more light on this, revealing that when hunting prey together, some octopus and fish species appear to share leadership. However, it is not always a harmonious group hunt, with the scientists observing aggression among group members, including fish displacing others by darting towards them, and octopuses punching some fish to the outer areas of the group.

After analysing data from 120 hours of dives, the scientists found that leadership is shared for different types of decisions. For example, goatfish specialized in deciding where the hunting pack moves — while the octopus decided whether and when the move would be made. The authors note that although other types of mixed-species hunting is known — such as badger-coyote, mixed birds, and moray eel-grouper groups — they appear to be less flexible in using social information to change strategy compared to octopus-fish hunting groups.

Writing in the *Nature Ecology and Evolution* journal, the authors say: “These findings expand our current understanding of what leadership is and what sociality is.” Eduardo Sampaio, from the Max Planck Institute of Animal Behaviour in Germany, and colleagues tracked octopus-fish hunting packs during scuba diving expeditions in the Red Sea. They saw 13 hunting groups consisting of one day octopus and different species of fish, including gold-saddle goatfish and blacktip groupers. The researchers suggest that this joint effort leads to better success compared to the octopus or fish acting alone. ★

## Divers Looked for Treasure in the Titanic's Wreckage — and Discovered a Stunning Lost Statue

- The RMS Titanic, Inc.'s latest expedition to the Titanic wreck site included over two million photos to capture the changing scope of the shipwreck.
- The team rediscovered the 2-foot-tall bronze statuette of the Roman goddess Diana, spotted in 1986, but lost since.
- Chronicling the changes in the Titanic has shown a 15-foot-long section of the port side of the bow's railing has fallen to the seafloor.

Researchers have uncovered the bronze “Diana of Versailles” statuette, once a centerpiece in the doomed Titanic's first class lounge, and now mired in oceanic muck. It marks the first sighting of the Roman goddess Diana statue since 1986 and highlights the sunken ship's ongoing decay.

The Georgia-based RMS Titanic, Inc. has the only legal salvage claim to the Titanic, the famous British passenger liner that struck an iceberg and tragically sank on April 14, 1912. A 2024 expedition to



Visibility was a murky 8-10 feet for the first dive. Not everyone went on the second dive and the visibility got a bit worse as the tide was going out during the surface interval and there was a lot of broken up kelp and grasses in the water.

During the first dive Carl's second stage swallowed some of those famous Monsterberries while entering the water and started free-flowing. Tom Earl was nearby and able to turn off his air. Jackie had

some bottled water so they were able to clear the obstruction.

Newer diver Ayan had a good fit for his rental drysuit and made a successful dive although he chose to sit out the second dive.

Aidian came to the area all the way from Oregon and someone directed him to the Flipper Dippers for a group to dive with. He enjoyed his dives on the "Famous Monastery Beach" and was invited to join us again in the future.






1.) Carl is getting a head start down to the beach.



2.) Carl enters the surf to join the divers.




3.) Oops! Carl is down and his 2nd stage is free flowing!

5.) This is where the 'Monastery Beach Crawl' comes in handy.




6.) With regulator cleared Tom and Carl head back in to join the group.



the North Atlantic Ocean wreck site was the ninth by the company, and the first since 2010. In the latest expedition, the crew spent 20 days taking over two million photos of the site, fully mapping the wreck and debris field.

The researchers hoped to uncover Diana, the 2-foot-tall statue that once signified luxury and design in the most expensive passenger area of the ocean



liner, they wrote in a statement. When the wreck occurred 112 years ago, the lounge couldn't withstand destruction. Diana once appeared in a photograph in 1986, but it hasn't been seen since — until now.

The team had an idea of where the statue sat, away from the ship, but with only a few hours left on the final day of the 2024 expedition and with time waning, the researchers were losing hope of locating Diana. But fortune favored the search, and the team found and photographed the statue in the nick of time.

While the debris field continues to contain pieces of the lost ship, the latest expedition also shows how the Titanic is altered while sitting in the cold and dark of the ocean floor.

The researchers discovered how the iconic bow of the ship had fallen away. "The once miraculously intact railing surrounding the bow's forecastle deck was missing a 15-foot-long section on the port side," according to the statement. A review of images from the seafloor taken earlier confirmed that the railing fell in a single piece and is now on the seafloor. The team believes the railing broke off at some point since 2022.

"We are saddened by this loss and the inevitable decay of the ship and the debris," the team wrote. "This evidence strengthens our mission to preserve and document what we can before it is too late." ★



## Planned Resting Place for the SS United States

That once-glorious trans-Atlantic ocean liner, the SS United States, which held the Blue Riband for the fastest crossing between London and New York, will be getting a new life as an artificial reef. Florida's Okaloosa County has bought the hulk, which was once capable of transporting 14,000 troops for 10,000 miles without refueling, and plans to sink it upright off the Florida panhandle as an artificial reef that will help reduce coastal erosion, provide a habitat for marine life, and make a spectacular dive site, rivaling that of the USS Oriskany, off the west panhandle. ★

## New Species Discovered Off Chile

Oceanographers led by the Palo Alto-based Schmidt Ocean Institute has discovered 100 new species across 10 seamounts during an expedition to the Nazca Ridge, 900 miles off the coast of Chile. One seamount, over two miles tall, supports a thriving ecosystem and features a coral garden the size of three tennis courts with rockfish, brittle stars, and king crabs. ★

## A spooky discovery deep in the Pacific: A new species of ghost shark

It may be early to get the Halloween decorations out for most, but in the deep waters of the Pacific Ocean spooky season is well underway.

Scientists said Tuesday they had discovered a new species of ghost shark that lives exclusively in the waters off Australia and New Zealand. The Australasian Narrow-nosed Spookfish was found during research surveys in the Chatham Rise, an area of ocean floor to the east of New Zealand, according to the National Institute of Water and Atmospheric Research (NIWA) based in Auckland.

Ghost sharks, also known as chimaeras, are a group of cartilaginous fish closely related to sharks and rays.

The newly discovered species has several distinctive features, including a long and narrow snout, broad pectoral fins, scale-free skin, and beak-like teeth. They are largely confined to the ocean floor up to 2,600 meters (8,530 feet) deep, feeding off crustaceans such as shrimp and molluscs.

It was given the scientific name of *Harriotta avia* by NIWA Fisheries scientist Brit Finucci, in memory of her



grandmother. Previously, it was considered to be part of a single globally distributed species. But research later showed that it is genetically and morphologically different to its cousins.

"Ghost sharks always surprise me!" Finucci told NBC News on Tuesday. "It just goes to show how little we know about our oceans, particularly the deep sea." Ghost sharks are "poorly studied" because of their remote living environment and cryptic nature, she said. This long-nosed spookfish was better researched among its kind as it is often observed on research surveys and is caught incidentally in commercial fisheries, Finucci said.

However, we still don't know their lifespan, population size or role in the ecosystem, Finucci noted. "There's still a lot to learn about ghost sharks!"

It had been suspected that this species may be different to those in other regions, but it took time to collect enough information to confirm that, Finucci said.

"We are still describing new species on a regular basis, and sometimes these discoveries have been right under our noses the whole time," she said. ★
